I came across some startling information recently in an article that I was reading at faithandleader-ship.com (A learning resource for Christian leaders and their institutions from Leadership Education at Duke Divinity). The title caught my attention, 'Will the church financially survive the COVID-19 pandemic?' I'd like to explore this question with you but also add that we have several reasons for concern as well as for faith.

Twelve people contributed to the article, one in particular from Bill Wilson (Director at The Center For Healthy Churches Clemmons, N.C.) is both alarming and encouraging. Wilson predicts that up to one-third of U.S. churches could be out of business by 2025. He points to LifeWay Research that says 5% of U.S. churches will close within the year because of the pandemic. That's five times the average closure rate for churches, according to The Christian Century magazine. Wilson acknowledges that this is all conjecturing, given the unprecedented nature and unknown length of the pandemic shutdown. His best guess is that churches will suffer a 33% decline in giving in 2020, in part because there was no live Easter offering. It's possible that the traditional surge in giving in December will help make up for lost ground, he said, but there's no way to know.

Drawing on his experience with his organization, which he has worked with several hundred churches during the past decade, Wilson estimates that one-quarter to one-third of churches operate on thin or no reserves. Yet despite evidence of a looming financial disaster, he remains hopeful that the Church can rise to the occasion. "The Church has an opportunity to show the world what healthy people do in times of crisis. Rather than panic and devolve into self-absorption and self-protection, we run toward the needs in our culture rather than away from them. We refuse to demonize others, but act out the story of the Good Samaritan on a daily basis. Local churches can lead the way to show their communities what 'love your neighbor as yourself' actually looks like." Wilson believes that our response to the crisis will help determine what happens next. "Is this the death of the church or the rebirth?" he said. "We'll see."

What? Have you even considered the above options? Decline until we die or rise to the occasion? Based on what I have experienced so far--you all want to live, and not just live, but thrive as God's people. I am proud to report that our giving is holding and our staff hasn't missed a paycheck nor have we stopped helping one another and our neighbors.

Our mission must be funded. First, see God funding the plan of creation as the ultimate giver. God gives life and God gave it again in Jesus and will give to His faithful another life, finally in His presence for eternity. So, we can't lose sight of our station as believers in this life, we are also givers. We must hold fast to the mission given to us by Christ that began at our baptisms. As we live out our faith in each of our given contexts, we discover that our faith is a gift from God that we can exercise everywhere and thrive under any circumstance. The greatest crisis would be for the Church to lose faith.

We are all tired, and concerned as we should be, BUT we remain faithful. Why? Because we love God and we love one another and the two together is the most powerful force on the planet. "Go," the world needs God.

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#### THE MAGIC OF THE SPIRIT

As I began this newsletter article, a hummingbird appeared and remained at my window long enough to get my attention and give me guilt for not filling up his feeder. This creature is a magical, exhaustingly speedy, eye-catching little drone. We've all seen, smiled, and "ahhhed" over them. They are almost birds of fantasy.

This week Redbox offered movies to rent for 99 cents so I happily chose  $Frozen\ 2$ . I saw  $Frozen\ (1)$  and loved it — the music, the color, the ingenious animation and imagination. (I am a confessed Disney movie girl.) But, when  $\underline{2}$  came out, I heard rumblings of wicked undertones, political correctness, and some other ugly things about it, and so, brokenhearted, I wouldn't rent it. But — 99 cents! So, armed with my self-righteousness, I watched it last night after Gayward went to bed. (He is NOT a Disney movie boy.) I didn't see *anything* like what I'd heard about. Admittedly, I did fall asleep for part of it, so I determined to watch it again this morning. I love watching the bonus features also so I viewed them  $1^{st}$  and found myself drawn into the making of the movie, understanding and sympathizing with choices the producers had to make to keep, re-do, or discard scenes and songs. Then fully awake and energized to find the bad stuff, I watched the movie again.

I fell under the spell of the fantasy in this quality-made film, cried a little, and exclaimed "Thank you, Jesus," in a narrowly-won victory of good over evil. For a <u>cartoon</u> sequel to a <u>cartoon</u>, based loosely on a Hans Christian Anderson fairy tale about a mythical Norwegian Ice Queen, I was completely entranced. No sex, no cursing, no real bloody killing. What had prompted the negatives I'd heard about before, some I ashamedly admit to repeating to someone else, like so much silly gossip? So I began to dissect:

- Super strong family values and love with parent/child, sister/sister, leadership/kingdom folks
- Racial inclusivity dark-skinned people, light skinned people, the Northuldral people of the Enchanted Forest
- Strong, fair leadership and genuine concern for the wellbeing of the kingdom of Arendelle (city dwellers) and Northundra (forest folks)
- Respect for "spirits" of the world exemplified in air, wind, fire and earth, not mentioning nor worshiping our God or gods of any kind, but just "respect for"
- Tearing down of a barrier that split the 2 kingdoms and showing considerate unification and equality.

And then it hit me – it was <u>magic</u>: that illusive element of the unknown that can be portrayed in evil, bad ways, or light-hearted, appealing ways. One of the sisters, the "Ice Queen," has powers to create ice out of thin air. In *Frozen*, she wrestled with it; in <u>2</u>, she had it under control and could use her power for good, which she did. I remembered one of the nay-sayers curling her lip and denouncing the movie as Satanic, and I guess it was because of <u>magic</u>.

Now, I am not saying you need to store *Frozen 2* on your movie shelf right beside *War Room* and *I Can Only Imagine* (Christian videos in case you didn't know), nor am I saying everyone's opinion I don't agree with is *wrong*. But looking at the bullet points, come out of the movie and into today's world. Aren't those all wonderful values God has directed us to seek and establish? Isn't even just one of them a step in the right direction?

In the movie, an impenetrable mist surrounds the forest after a grievous wrong was committed against the woods-folk 30-something years ago. Inside it, time pretty much stood still. What if — wild stretch here — that mist is our Virus? God has effectively "shut us down" and given us time to re-evaluate, re-appreciate, re-discover ourselves in light of His sovereign power. Hadn't we felt in our hearts that something was wrong and we were spinning out of control in a crazy world? The Ice Queen has to go in search of an answer — we've had The Answer all along. And doesn't it seem a little like <u>magic</u> to you when unexpectedly a prayer was answered in a completely different way than what you'd asked, or a parking spot opens, light turns green, much-needed money appears, etc.? When God pours His grace upon us, doesn't it just make you catch your breath in a soul- satisfying magical way?

My little bird of fantasy and magic is somewhere, awaiting his lunch. I expect him to buzz my window again soon, cutting his eyes upward toward the empty feeder and tapping his watch for me to hurry up. I think the Holy Spirit sent him — a reminder for me to get un-*frozen* and up to do my job in the Kingdom. I think (hope) the mist is lifting and we can all get back to being attentive to the Spirit's call. We're in His hands, under His wings, and worth more than 99 cents!

## Finance Report

It's been hard these past few months not to be together and we are so grateful to have the office open as of June 15th and be able to meet (even if it's outside for now). The Finance Committee has been busy trying to take care of the normal duties of the church. We didn't have to furlough any of our employees and even though the office was closed, they continued to do their job. John and Lena came into work each day. Nichole and Wendy came into the office to take care of business they couldn't do from home. Phones were forwarded to their homes or cells so we didn't miss anyone that had a need to contact the church or Pastor. The Pastor, Harry, and Katie worked from home and periodically came into the office when there was a need.

Our income has been much lower during COVID-19 (decreased an average of \$14,975 a month), but we have managed to keep our heads above water. The conference has cut our portion of the pastor's pension in half, they have allowed us to only pay interest on our mortgage through July and our electric bill has decreased since we are not using all the buildings full time. These three things alone have decreased our bills by over \$7900 a month for the four months. We applied for and received \$41,000 from the Payroll Protection Loan from the Federal Government. This loan is how we could continue to pay our staff. All of our payments will go back to normal in July, which means we need to increase our giving to \$15,000 a month to continue to survive.

I personally want to thank all of you that have been such faithful givers during this time. It would have been impossible to get through this crisis without your dedicated giving, the cuts from the conference, and the Payroll Protection Loan we received. Thank you again and may God bless you and your family.

### Food Bridge and Bread Basket Ministries

As we navigated through COVID-19 these past months, we were mindful of the impact it had on our volunteers and clients. In order to continue to provide as many services as possible, we had to change our ways of distribution to keep our clients and volunteers safe.

The Bread Basket and Clothes Closet was completely closed because we couldn't provide the social distancing necessary to keep everyone safe. We were able to keep the Food Bridge open by going to a drive through only and not allowing people out of their vehicles. They drove through, we checked them in, and then someone loaded their food into their vehicles. The drive through worked well even though it took a little longer to get everyone served.

We also limited the number of volunteers that could work in the building at the same time. We not only did this on Thursday, but everyday of the week when we were receiving food. They were required to wear mask and gloves while working. A number of our volunteers had concerns about working during this time and we encouraged anyone with health concerns to stay home and not feel guilty about making that decision. We had 12 faithful volunteers that worked every Thursday to keep this program operational. Thank you, faithful servants, you are doing an awesome job! We didn't miss a Thursday.

Clay Electric's Operation Round Up awarded the Food Bridge an \$5,000 grant during this time. The grant was a nice gift so we could continue to purchase food during this time. If was difficult to find place that would sell to us in bulk. That was and still is a challenge now.

We opened the Bread Basket back up May 30th. We have limited the number of volunteers working in the building and limited the number of clients that can be in the building at the same time. We require everyone to wear a mask and if they don't have one we provide one for them.

Our church buildings may have been closed, but the ministries continued to be there for the people of our church and the community.

While sitting outside this morning having breakfast, I was looking out at the leaves wisping in the breeze. The sun was peeking thru the trees, I watching the hummingbirds feed on the sweet juice and the cardinals were fighting to get food out of the bird feeder. I saw all of this knowing that all this was made possible because of God's creation, with the help of Mother Nature. It brought back memories of my childhood growing up when my dad would peek into the room to wake us up with the saying, "Rise and shine! It's daylight in the swamp!"

While Looking up the meaning of what my father was saying, the following article popped up. It was a reminder of what the TRUE meaning of that saying meant other than my dad saying "Get Up".

I felt it in my heart to share this article with my church family and friends:

"My dad would come into our rooms, flip the light switch on and say, "Rise & shine! It's daylight in the swamp!" This was always followed by our groans and complaints. Such a rude awakening! He's been gone since 1967 and as annoying as that was, I would give anything to hear those words once again.


