The district will be utilizing the resources from the Unstuck Group who 'helps leaders grow healthy churches by guiding them through experiences that focus on vision, strategy, and action.'

'Stuck' (as defined by Google dictionary):

Be fixed in a particular position or unable to move or be moved.

Be or become fixed or jammed in one place as a result of an obstruction. "He drove into a bog, where his wheels stuck fast."

<u>Similar</u>: become trapped, jammed, jam, wedged, lodged, fixed, embedded, immobilized, unable to move, get bogged down

Be unable to progress with a task or find the answer or solution to something. "I'm doing the crossword and I'm stuck."

Remain in a static condition; fail to progress. "He lost a lot of weight but had stuck at 210 pounds."

<u>Informal</u>: be or remain in a specified place or situation, typically one perceived as tedious or unpleasant. "I don't want to be stuck in an office all my life."

Things get stuck. Churches get stuck. Clergy get stuck. However you define yourself, you may have some experience with the topic and if so then I think we can agree that being 'Stuck' no matter the circumstance is neither easy nor fun. The district wants us to thrive and be vital within our communities so they will be providing access to Unstuck's resources and assistance.

I am sometimes a speaker of platitudes. Right now the one timeliest to me is "You reap what you sow," or "We are reaping what we've sown." This can be a deadly negative statement, a sarcastic comeback, a supercilious declaration, or a hopeful prophecy.

Farmers or folks who garden understand the truth of this platitude. If soil is not properly prepared to receive seed, if animals are left to fend for themselves through negligence, the end results are going to be less than satisfactory, fruitless, discouraging, and needlessly expensive.

We can say the same for those professing Christianity. Going to church on Sunday doesn't necessarily make you "A Christian." Neither does being there every time the doors are open. In order to reap even a little bit of the delicious harvest God has prepared for us, we have to take a pro-active step forward and **commit**. Your deeds today can determine the bounty of your harvest. If you are just content with a little, perhaps that is what you'll get.

But God has so much more for you. If He sees you sowing thought, word, or deed sincerely, there's a good chance your harvest will be delicious. If your worship in church is heartfelt and genuine, you'll probably recognize the increase of fruitfulness. If your worship in private involves some frank conversations with God where you pour out your troubles, worries, wishes, or questions, His broad shoulders can take your burdens and begin to point you toward solutions. When you decorate your conversations liberally with praise and admiration for His wonderfulness, it's like adding fertilizer to your soil. Your roots delve deeper, your branches stretch upward, and the abundance of your blessings become more apparent in your life. Troubles will still beset you – we'll have troubles until Christ returns with his mighty trouble-chopping sword – but your certainty in the Lord's words and promises will give you strength and confidence.

The ripples of your choices will impact others. In the Bible, obedience or disobedience in one generation would affect following generations. Today, it doesn't take the length of a generation to see the results of seeds wastefully sown. Unfortunately, we are witnessing a lot of bad harvests. It is going to be a tough job in some cases to right the wrongs and as Christians we realize we cannot do it alone. So: step forward, **commit**, join into the activities of your church family, learn a Bible verse of more than 2 lines, turn off the radio and sing or talk to God as you drive. Sow those fat seeds of Truth and watch the spiritual growth happen. Let the Holy Spirit walk before and beside us as we sow, let our life's song reflect the assurance that Jesus is in charge and that God will provide the sun and rain to nourish our souls into a splendidly bountiful harvest.

The Food Bridge: How a Ministry Grew to Impact Thousands Written by Bethany Hill

On the far side of the Middleburg United Methodist Church campus sits a small, unassuming structure. Named after the family who originally donated it, the Budington Building might appear insignificant to the average onlooker. But to pass judgment so quickly is to do an injustice to the impactful ministry that calls the Budington Building home.

Established in 2002, the Food Bridge began as a simple operation. Families who visited the church and requested assistance were given a bag of groceries to aid them in their struggle. After some time, families were permitted to visit twice a month if their level of need required it. At this point, the Food Bridge helped an average of eighteen families each week.

Since then, however, the ministry has expanded astronomically. From technological advancements, such as the addition of two walk-in freezers, to the increase in the sheer amount of food that is received and distributed each week, it cannot be denied that the Food Bridge has far surpassed its modest roots. Debbie Taylor, the ministry's resident number expert, has all the proof. Over 1100 families actively receive assistance from the Food Bridge, with an average of just over 160 visiting each week. Thanks to a partnership with Feeding Northeast Florida, food is donated by several major corporations – including Publix, Winn Dixie, and Walmart – with the total amount of food received exceeding 2.2 million pounds. Mille J. Wilkes, the coordinator of the Food Bridge, humbly shared that she "never imagined [the ministry] would grow to this size," a testament with which many long-time volunteers can likely agree.

However, the Food Bridge hasn't just grown in size; it's also grown in spirit. Human connection and spiritual support are at the core of the ministry's work, so much so that a church service is held each Thursday morning before the doors open. First started about three years ago, this service gives volunteers and recipients a chance to gather together, offer praise, and share the troubles and triumphs that are currently on their minds.

Thankfully, the Food Bridge's expansion hasn't gone unnoticed. In September, the ministry was chosen as a recipient of the Operation Round Up Grant. Since it was implemented by Clay Electric Cooperative in 2016, Operation Round Up has provided monetary support to numerous charitable organizations throughout North Florida. The Food Bridge received \$15,000 – the maximum possible award – all of which will go towards vehicle repair, building maintenance, and the purchase of nonperishable food.

From its humble beginnings to its awe-inspiring growth, the Food Bridge is truly a testament to the power of the Spirit. So, next time you pass by the Budington Building, try to give it more than an indifferent glance.


Thank you so much for your support of our sister church in Mayorquin!
